Joel Rosenberg, violist, will lead an **ensemble of local and guest musicians** in a full-length concert of chamber works for viola, violin and piano, including trio and solo performances.

Mr Rosenberg will be accompanied by Kanab educator and violinist, **Linda Ghidossi-DeLuca, violinist, Mary Danzig, violist, Peter Danzig, Cellist, Anna Jensen**, the sensational young Navajo pianist **Connor Chee**, and contemporary Native American composer and performer, **Arvel Bird**.

The program will open with Joel Rosenberg, Linda Ghidossi-DeLuca and Connor Chee in a trio performance of The Seasons by Astor Piazzola, followed with a solo performance by Connor Chee of the Civil War Variations for Piano, by **John Logan Skelton**.

To conclude the first half of this concert, Joel, Linda and Connor will perform Symphonia Concertante for Violin, Viola and Piano, by Mozart.

Following an INTERMISSION, Joel Rosenberg, Linda Ghidossi DeLuca, Connor Chee, Mary Danzig, Peter Danzig and Arvel Bird will form a sextet to perform the Sonata for Viola and Chamber Ensemble by Niccolò Paganini. Concluding the second half of this outstanding concert, the full Sextet will perform three original compositions by **Arvel Bird**, entitled Bear, Red Tail Hawk, and Dragonfly/Star of Munster Medley.

Connor Chee, born in Page, Arizona, 1987, received his Bachelor of Music from the Eastman School of Music. While a student, he performed solo concerts in Ohio, Arizona, Utah and New Mexico, and attended the Chautauqua Music Institution in 2007 and 2008. Prior to his studies at Eastman, Connor attended the Cincinnati School for Creative and Performing Arts, where he studied under Simon Goykhman and Anna

Weinstein, competing in the World Piano Competition, earning two gold medals, two silver medals and one bronze medal. He has performed at Carnegie Hall, The United Nations, the United States Department of Energy, and for American Indian Recognition Month, Cincinnati Pops, Hamilton/Fairfield, Blue Ash Symphony and Symphony of the Canyons. He is currently working toward his Master's in Music at the College-Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati.

Linda Ghidossi-DeLuca earned Bachelor and Masters Degrees from The Juilliard School, has performed with Yo-Yo Ma; as principal violist and soloist, appeared with three San Francisco Bay Area orchestras; recorded music for films, including Mars Attacks, Predator II, Soap Dish, Cop And A Half, and others; recorded a remake of the Star Wars Themes conducted by John Williams at Skywalker Sound Stage in Marin County, California; and toured in the USA and Canada with the Dixie Chicks in 2003, as a member of a string quartet.

Joel Rosenberg is a graduate of The Juilliard School in New York City. Mr. Rosenberg has received the Individual Artist Grant from the Utah Arts Council, and a Fulbright Grant to Italy, where he studied at the Santa Cecilia Conservatory in Rome, and the Accademia Musicale Chigiana in Siena.

He has conducted the Australian Ballet with the Elizabethan Philharmonic and the Orchestra of Victoria at the Sydney Opera House, as well as the New Zealand Opera in Auckland, the Utah Opera, Ballet West with the Utah, Phoenix and Portland Symphony Orchestras, the San Francisco Ballet and the New Mexico Symphony, the Erik Hawkins Dance Company, and has appeared in concerto performances with pianist, Leon Fleisher.

Presently, Mr. Rosenberg conducts the American West Symphony and Ballet, and the Paradigm Chamber Orchestra in Salt Lake City. <http://www.joelrosenbergconductor.com/pages/about.html>

Arvel Bird, a Native American Flutist/Violinist, is known around the world for his dramatic connection between Native American and Celtic traditions, stirring up scenes that echo from North American memory. Dubbed "Lord of the Strings" by fans and music critics, his music evokes the soul of North American history and is thoroughly entertaining, but also enlightening and humanizing. In a language and experience that captures the hearts of all audiences, he's emotional without being condescending, intellectual without being pretentious. Kenny Hall - A premiere Cowboy Song and Western Folk Life performer in the Intermountain area, Kenny Hall's artistry and character is clearly reflected in his music: direct, uncontrived, and honest. A native son of Utah, whose great, great, grandparents came west with Brigham Young, Kenny's life and career is centered in Cannonville, Utah, where he lives with his wife Jean.

Vice President of the Cowboy Poets of Utah, Kenny performs regularly in venues such as Western Legends in Kanab, the National Cowboy Poetry gathering in Elko, NV, Butch Cassidy Days in Beaver County, UT, Everett Ruess Days in Escalante, UT, and many others. His artistic talent includes creating beautiful, well-crafted custom saddles, hand-made chaps and gear, and award-winning camp wagons. A former PRCA bull rider, Kenny's goal is to "...pass on and keep alive this heritage and way of life that has been handed down to me by my family and those gone before me."

Otter Creek - Peter and Mary Danzig, award-winning performance artists from Salt Lake City, will perform a spellbinding mix of original Utah and American roots music. Known for their versatility in style and instrumentation as well as their tight vocal harmonies, these two are extraordinarily gifted and perfectly matched.

The *Deseret News* has described Mary's playing as having "electrifying energy... style and panache." Mary has a Master of Music degree in violin performance and won first place in the 2011 Utah State Fiddle Championship, also placing among the top three in each of the past four years.

instrumentalist on the mandolin, fiddle, guitar, mountain dulcimer, banjo, and viola, Peter won the "Better World Category" of the New Songs Showcase at the Walnut Valley Festival in Winfield, KS in 2010. He was selected as a finalist in the Susanne Millsaps Performing Songwriter Showcase in 2009 and 2010, and won the top honor in 2011. Peter placed 2nd in the Utah State Fiddle Championship in 2010. In 2011, he placed 2nd at the National Mandolin Championship and won the Utah State Mandolin Championship.

Otter Creek's songs are deeply informed from the folk tradition, exploring human experience from a refreshing and challenging perspective. Their first album, *Hunter's Moon*, received international airplay at #27 on the Folk Music Charts in February 2012.

Description: Planet Earth, our moon and our star all come into perfect alignment as Amazing Earthfest 2012 concludes. Kanab is right along the path of a very rare **Annular Eclipse of the Sun**. "Annular" means the Moon is at a point in its orbit too far away to completely cover the Sun even though it passes directly in front of the Sun. The result: 88% of the Sun is eclipsed at maximum, leaving a "ring of fire" in the sky and odd lighting effects as our star is greatly dimmed. The entire phenomenon will last from 6:23 PM until sunset at 8:37 PM.

Don't expect big telescopes because our event will be decidedly low-tech, emphasizing personal centering on our connection to nature and our place in the Universe. After sunset, enjoy storytelling around the campfire and unaided viewing of the constellations. Bring refreshments and goodies to share.
Special solar eclipse viewing glasses will be available.

To view the eclipse on your own: The annular phase

(maximum eclipse) of this celestial occurrence will be visible in Kanab from exactly 7:32 PM to 7:36 PM, at locations east of Kanab Creek with an unobstructed view to the west. **Warning:** Even though the solar eclipse is nearly total, at no time is it ever safe to look directly at the Sun. **Obtain your viewing glasses for a small donation at many Earthfest events, or at the Earthfest Information Table.**
